NEIGHBOURFOOD - BALLINCOLLIG

‘We’d like to say a big thanks and a big hello to everyone in the Parish. We are operating for the last 2 months out of the Carrigrohane Centre. It has been a wonderful space to grow Neighbourfood Ballincollig. For those of you who do not know anything about the Neighbourfood movement, it is a new way to do your weekly shop - online, supporting local producers, and with zero food wastage involved. We create relationships with local producers, artisans, farmers, bakers, and growers. Our virtual farmer’s market opens on a Thursday and runs through just after midnight on a Monday. Our customers place their orders during this time. On Tuesday, all the orders get prepared to spec - so there is no wastage. On Wednesday, fun starts! The farmers pick the vegetables, the butchers prepare the orders, the bakers bake. And they deliver the freshest produce in the morning to the Centre. Our customers come and pick up their orders in the afternoon. Everything is safely distanced, and abides by latest Health & Safety requirements.

We have slowly built the market up over the past few months, and we now have over 45 producers offering over 3,000 products. Our market includes Izz Cafe, Sage Restaurant, Leamlara Honey, Tom Durcan Meats, Ballycotton Seafood, Sesasian, Malay Kitchen, My Goodness, The Natural Foods Bakery, Bread & Roses, Hederman, Food for Humans, Organic Republic, Kilbrack Farm and YumGelato amongst others. Summer 2021 in the Carraig Centre

The buzz is getting bigger here in the Carraig Centre! It has been wonderful to see groups starting to make plans for getting back together within the COVID guidelines, first tentatively, then with more confidence as the weeks, and COVID numbers move in the right direction. The weather is helping matters too of course - and what has been most encouraging to me personally is to see the Carraig Centre full on Sunday mornings for our hybrid (live and on-line) services!

Our garden committee has been very active, and the patio garden is now a place to relax, meet people safely outdoors, enjoy a cup of coffee together or watch the children playing in the playground. Adventurers have also been using the outdoor spaces as well during alternating Sunday services. The planting has proceeded with vigorous growth, the canopy cover has been a successful experiment to date, and as I write, the woodwork is being varnished! A very big thank you to Rob Devoy, Kathy and Chuck, Mel and Viv, and various young people who have contributed energy, creativity and enthusiasm.



The play areas and garden are proving popular for booked in young families, birthday parties and social get togethers which is wonderful, and the 5 summer camps that are now booked in will make use of these great facilities as well. Our own Youth programme is planning Friday evening activities using the spaces, both for our own young people, and hopefully as a way to interact with local young people as well.

This summer the 5 camps will feature two Lego activities, an Art camp, a music camp and a general activities for younger kids camp. Several of our own young people have signed up to help with some of these camps which is terrific! While we are not running the Bible camp this year again, it is great that members of Carrigrohane Union of Parishes can engage with the wider community through these popular activities.

Autumn activities are booking in too - and two Irish Countrywomen Associations (Local and Regional) have booked the Mezzanine for regular weekly meetings. Slimming World is back in business as well and we have several other tentative bookings that we are trying to fit into the jigsaw puzzle too! Of course, our regular Enable Ireland, YMCA and recovery support groups are all planned into the rich tapestry of community groups making use of the Carraig Centre.

It will be wonderful, in the middle of all this activity, to have our hard-working office (Jaki and Patsy) back in place from early July; we also hope as the restrictions lift and things get clearer so that we can ask any of our volunteers, who are willing and able, to think about returning! We will probably need to start some volunteers on Saturdays as well as we have several activities that will be running then, birthday parties included. Plans are still only at discussion stage for this.

From the TCC Garden Committee:

You may have noticed that the gardens at the Carraig Centre back patio are almost finished! They are looking lovely! If you have not had a chance to see it, please find some time to do so!

Many people outside of our Parish are enjoying the space and the beauty of the flowers and plants that God has created! This garden space which we are sharing with many different groups, is hopefully, one more way in which we can make positive community connections and ultimately be able to share about our most gracious God.

You can have a part in making this garden an inviting place by volunteering a few hours each month to care for the garden areas! (You can make it more fun by inviting a friend to help you and introduce them to the gardens and the Carraig Centre!)

What: TCC garden waters and weeders

Responsibilities:

1. Watering the TCC back patio beds twice a week, and roadside beds periodically if a dry spell happens.
2. Light weeding of the beds and tidying up the spaces.
3. Brief recording of what work was done.
4. Calling the Carraig Centre to set up your watering times so it does not conflict with scheduled outdoor bookings.

How often to do the tasks? Depends on the number of volunteers, if we have 4 volunteers then it will be one week on in a 4 week period; if we have 8 volunteers, then one week on in 8 weeks.

Ideally, we would like the **back patio gardens** to be watered and weeded twice a week, especially as our new plants are getting established. As well, a tidy up of the patio area (sweeping) would be helpful.

The **roadside beds** might need periodic watering during dry periods. A tidy up of the roadside beds (rubbish collection, weeding, and sweeping stray bark mulch back into the beds) should be done twice a week.

In the **winter months**, watering will probably not be needed, but leaf, and paving sweeping would be appreciated.

The time/day for these tasks would preferably be Monday and Thursday or Tuesday and Friday between the hours of 9:30 am and 4:30 pm.

Brief instructions will be given at the beginning of your first time volunteering!

Mission & Ministry Appeal 2021

We do thank everyone in the Parish for your generous and sacrificial giving - which continues to enable so much mission and ministry to happen.



Over the course of the Autumn, we're going to have a specific focus upon our Big Vision for the parish and as part of that we will be focusing upon the topic of giving, with a Gift Day being planned in October. Over the Summer if you would like to review your giving, please do get in touch with the parish office.

The Select Vestry has set an aim to raise 20,000 euro this year through the Gift Day in the Autumn and a Christmas Festival Fundraiser. This is a large sum of money, but we hope this will provide the opportunity to work together, raise the needed funds, and see fresh faith forming as we continue to reach out with the good news of the Gospel in our Union of Parishes.

We realise that it is a difficult time for some, and if this is you, please do **not** feel any pressure from this appeal. And for those who can, we encourage you to consider what you can give as a thanksgiving offering.

The 20,000 Euro which we hope to raise will be put towards:

- The new post being created of Associate Minister for the Union of Parishes
- The added expenses being incurred for on-line services which have been essential over the lock-down – and continue to be much appreciated.

This is very much a faith-based appeal – and we're asking simply if individuals and households might partner with us in either once off gifts or by increasing their monthly giving slightly. It would be very much appreciated.

This €20,000 target amount takes into consideration that our giving in 2020 was down by nearly €10,000 Euro on the previous 12 months due to the pandemic and not being able to meet in person. It is hoped that by launching this appeal now we can plan for growth into the future.

Singing

As we continue to adhere to the guidelines for Covid-Compliance. We still unfortunately cannot enjoy congregational singing. I want to thank all our musicians for their help and going way beyond the call of duty in helping lead reflective times of worship in all our places of worship.



Over the summer in our church buildings we will be continuing with a mix of recorded worship in many of our services – and using a range of music with our parish musicians. We do hope congregational singing will resume in the near future, but until that time comes we will persevere and keep each other safe.

Holy Communion

Holy Communion will be available in both kinds thanks to a resolution of the House of Bishops. Grease and line an 8-inch cake tin.

Separate 1. Chop 2 and 3. Set aside.

Blend 4 and 5. Add 6 gradually. Beat in 7 and add 8, 9 and 10.

Stir in 1, 2 and 3. Add 11 and 12 as necessary. Blend in 13.

Put into prepared tin, decorate with a few flaked 3s, and bake on a low shelf for 3 ½ hours.

If the top browns prematurely, reduce heat to 140°C (275°F, Gas mark 1) and cover with greaseproof paper.

Eat with prayer and thanksgiving, and resolve to follow the example of 2 Timothy 1:6!

Is there light at the end of a very long lockdown tunnel? Corrie Ten Boom's quote encourages us to consider –

"When a train goes through a tunnel and it gets dark, you don't throw away the ticket and jump off. You sit still and trust the engineer".

The last few months were indeed dark and difficult for many, but by God's grace it seems that we are facing brighter days. **Updates;**

Gift bags for families: St. Patrick's Day in Ballina, we sent out gift bags to the children of Mill View and Greenhills Estates. Through continuing connections, we have been able to keep contact with the children who used to come to our Kidz Clubs on the Big Blue Bus. A few volunteers crocheted shamrocks for all the bags. The St. Vincent de Paul and Dealz of Ballina also contributed colouring books, calendars, playing cards and sweets for the children. A ceramicist from Sligo made Shamrock fridge-magnets. We also included scripture colouring pages and a copy of St. Patrick's Prayer in each bag.



For Easter, we filled the bags with Easter eggs, gifts and Easter colouring sheets. We also added a new booklet from Ruth Gyves, entitled Joy for the Soul, which she had produced just in time for Easter. Ruth is a Diocesan Lay Reader in the Dublin and Glendalough Diocese of the Church of Ireland. On this occasion, we distributed the bags of joy to the elderly, the medically vulnerable and carers in the community. A volunteer from Ballina Methodist Church also made flower posies, which we gave to neighbours and friends of Ballina Churches Together. We delivered flowers, chocolates, gospel c.d.s and booklets to the retired Mercy nuns who reside in Ballina. It was a joy to bless so many people, who were somewhat weary of lockdowns.

Pastoral care: Our work has continued in pastoral care. There are people who live alone, the elderly - isolated from family and friends, some of whom do not have a support network. We continued all through the lockdowns to reach out to them through various means ... phone calls, messaging, post and doorstep visits to those who live alone in the countryside. We have also continued to take elderly people for hospital tests to the nearest Hospitals. We have continued out Pastoral Care work in the Community. Through a 'Ministry of Presence' on the streets of Ballina we have kept up contact with many of the men who used to frequent the Big Blue Bus. The prolonged period of lockdown and isolation has caused the vulnerable to experience loneliness and confusion. Sadly, for some, such as our friend K, he now requires hospitalisation at this time. We had worked with him and taken him out litter-picking in order to get him out of the house and keep him active. However, his mental health continued to deteriorate over time. He remains in our prayers.

Big Blue Bus: It was a difficult decision to say goodbye to the Big Blue Bus. The iconic bus was a well-loved by those frequented it and news of its sale was met with sadness. At the weekend, it was a place for adults to meet for community, tea, biscuits, song, prayer and community. Many young people also visited the bus at the weekend also. The bus was a café for them and a warm place to be on a cold winters' night. A place for hot chocolate, laughter and banter! Every Saturday evening, the young people would be standing outside Penney's, waiting for the bus to arrive. Through the buses ministry we came to know many people.

We also used to visit various housing estates for Kids Clubs. The children of Mill View and Greenhills Estates, would tumble out of their homes and pile onto the Big Blue Bus. We played games, had bible storytelling, songs and arts and crafts. The bus was a happy place filled with laughter and fun. For the turning on of the Christmas lights, St. Patricks Day and at the Salmon Festival, the Big Blue Bus would be parked outside the Jackie Clarke Museum. A team of volunteers were seated outside for face-painting and the children loved to visit the bus along with their parents. Memories of the Big Blue Bus will stay with us for years to come. Many happy memories of friendships made, laughter and song, copious cups of tea and of winter nights in Tesco's car park!



Chalk art: Ballina is a picturesque town situated on the River Moy. These days fishermen are once more back in the famous Ridgepool in search of Wild Atlantic Salmon. This is also a popular area for pedestrians as people enjoy walking around the bridges that cross the Moy. It is here that we leave our chalk messages on the pavements opposite the Cathedral. These messages can be funny, inspirational, thought provoking and scriptural. We usually get to do chalk-art once or twice a month, depending on the weather!

The art messages has been very well received by so many people, who have appreciated the messages of hope, joy and peace which they give. One lady approached recently and expressed her gratitude for the chalk art. She is interested in knowing more about Jesus and asked for a Bible. She had been looking in the shops for one and could not find one. We were able to give her a New Testament. She loves to sew and now she is making gift-bags so we can continue to bless people in the community.

Missional community: We brought our (post Alpha group) Bible study on zoom on Thursdays at 7:30pm. We also brought the men's group from the bus (on zoom) and have a time of worship, prayer, and Bible study on Wednesday evenings at 8pm. We have had a few new people start to attend this. Our prayer group has continued through zoom on Sunday evenings.

Farewell: In the past year we said goodbye to 4 of our volunteers. Three have moved to Scotland to work in a Church, and one has returned to Brazil after helping with the Futsal in the community for 4 years. Emma is also leaving Ballina and will finish her role at the end of June 2021. Following a 5-year spell in Ballina, she has taken the opportunity to review her future and felt that this was a good time to look for new challenges in her working life. However, Marian will take over as lead in the work and Rosemonde Adamson will be the new part-time pioneer evangelist. They will continue to raise up more people in the community to help build on the mission work begun in 2016.

A greeting from Father Kyrillos Hanna – the local priest from the Egyptian Coptic Church, a congregation who will be making their home in the Parish Centre on Sunday mornings.

"Our community in Cork has about 30 families, and includes some students from Canada and some single people – coming to about 150 people. We are from Egypt, Eritrea, and Ethiopia. On Sunday morning we have our Mass. Our Liturgy which starts with the morning offering of incense followed by the offering of the Lamb, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Faithful. In the Liturgy of the Word – we have reading from the letters of St Paul and then from St James or St John, and also we have reading from the Acts and reading from the Gospel. We usually have Bible Study and we have a Sunday School for the kids and we also have youth meetings. Most of them are over Zoom with youth-related topics. Also, we have midnight praises...and in the afternoon – also over Zoom. The Egyptians in our community are from Cairo, Alexander and other places...some work as engineers, some as doctors."

The **Coptic Orthodox Church of Alexandria** is an ancient Christian Church. It is one of the oldest Churches in the world, having been founded by Saint Mark the Apostle, the writer of the second gospel, in the first Century. The word 'Coptic' comes from the ancient Egyptian word 'hekaptah' meaning 'Egypt', and thus 'Coptic' merely means 'Egyptian.' As a conservative Church, the Coptic Church has carefully preserved the Orthodox Christian Faith in its earliest and purest form, handing it down from generation to generation, unaltered and true to the Apostolic doctrines and patterns of worship.

There are many links between the Coptic Church and Ireland as early as the 9th Century. More recently, the first Church was established in 1993 by HG Bishop Antony, Bishop of Ireland, Scotland, North-East England and affiliated regions. Since then, His Grace has opened 7 churches all over the island of Ireland, established St Athanasius Monastery for monks and St George's Abbey for nuns.

Update from Matt Gould:

Over the summer the two big courses I have been involved in, come to an end. As I have been helped with time for study, financially, and supported in prayer, it seemed a good time to give an update and say **thank you** to CUP...



In mid July I complete my last module for the **Church Army Evangelist Course** which I have been working on over these last two years. During 2019 and early 2020 this involved travelling for training weekends to Church Army Centre in Sheffield, with a mix of taught content, group discussion and personal assignments. Since COVID hit, training has been online, which has reduced my air-miles carbon footprint, but definitely lacked the peer support element of meeting together.

Overall, I have really enjoyed the course, especially meeting people from many walks of life who share a passion and call to reach the lost with the secure hope we have in Jesus. The training has fed directly into the work of CUP in Ballincollig and beyond, and it has refined my own sense of call and place in God's wonderful tapestry.

Because of the COVID picture in the UK at present, I will not be travelling over for the scheduled commissioning on 20th of July, but will be commissioned at a later date once arrangements are confirmed from Church Army. **Please pray for where all this is leading, as I don't know - but God does, and that is enough.**

Prior to starting the C.A. Evangelist course I was working towards a **MA in Applied Theology from the Irish Bible Institute** based in Dublin - sure if you are going to do one course, why not do two! I have completed four significant modules (Evangelicalism: Theory and Practice, Pastoral Care, Church and Mission, and lastly Biblical Interpretation) which has been wonderful, encouraging, tiring and stretching all at the same time. I have never worked so hard on something in my life!

The MA finishes this year whenever I get my Dissertation done (deadline mid-October). For my topic I chose to focus on the Tree of Life - tracing its first appearance in the Genesis garden, through its use in Proverbs and how the prophets reimagine it, and finishing by unpacking its reappearance in Revelation. Amazingly, 15,000 words on a tree may not feel enough!

This chance to develop my theological education has been fantastic, and has fed directly into my youth teaching and wider service leading and speaking over these last few years. **A huge thank you to the parish for support to work this all through**, and also a big thank you to my family, and sorry for being a bit grouchy towards essay hand-in deadlines.

Now back to the dissertation...!



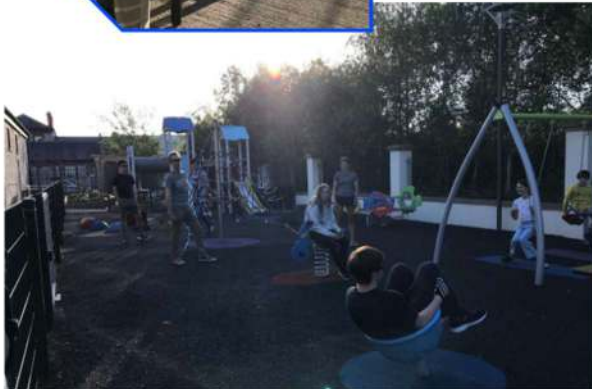
