

We continue to make some small steps forward on Sunday mornings – I look forward to working with all of the congregations, as we prepare to welcome new families and new post holders across our buildings.


This year has been a strange year, but we hope that we can build upon the foundations laid on in all of these places.

Copies of more detailed accounts will be available – and any questions or queries are welcomed.

A few things to note:

- The Fair Share amount is lower than expected because of our Assistant Minister vacancy.
- The Carraig Centre accounts are <u>separate</u> to the main parish accounts.
- The Carraig Centre has contributed very substantially towards the running of the parish office.
- The large spending on property is accounted for by the works on the Rectory, Blarney and St Peter's. Finance for these projects was from Heritage Grant aid and parish monies held in the RCB in Dublin (see capital payments RCB) – **not** from current parish finances.
- Equal amounts of the Designated Income and the Miscellaneous expenditure is accounted for by the Serge account – an in/out amount.

UPDATES/REPORTS ON 2021

Staffing Group

The staffing group operates under the Select Vestry and attempts to ensure that the Parish meets its legal responsibilities as an employer, and also that good practices are followed in the recruitment, selection and supervision of staff who are employed. Some of the tasks that the Staffing Group undertook during the year was assisting in the development of a job description for the Community Leader post in TCC, together with help in developing interview questions; working on a job brief with the Rector for the vacant Associate Minister post; preparing job descriptions for new Parish Administrator, Finance Officer and Caretaker while also ensuring that staff who left or transitioned to new roles had the opportunity to do an exit interview. Youth Work Review

As a result of changes in the youth work team, the Select Vestry is in the process of undertaking a review of the Parish's youth work to see if the model we currently operate is suitable or appropriate for the next 10 years or so. A small working group is in the process of getting feedback from young people, parents, volunteers, former staff as well as external bodies such as CDYC and CIYD. It is hoped that a report with recommendations will be made to the SV in June 2022. This will help inform the SV as they consider how to proceed with a replacement(s) for Matt and Katie. ECO GROUP

In October 2021 the Eco Group, and others from the parish, planted 28 Irish heritage apple trees, in the southeast corner of St. Peter's Field, Carrigrohane. We hope this project will be an educational tool about using green spaces for growing food, especially genetically diverse varieties. These apple trees provide a way of connecting with the St. Peter's neighbourhoods. Our neighbours are welcome to use the St. Peter's grounds for exercise and walks. The apple trees are adding to the visual interest of the field and in time can provide apples to sample!

Our CUP Eco Group continued to provide advice on best use of church grounds and ecomanagement issues for our union of parishes. We continue to set aside parts of our church yards to let the plants grow to flower which provides habitat and food for our pollinators. We also are gradually bringing in more native trees, and shrub species into the churchyards. These varieties tend to survive longer and are more resilient and disease resistant than nonindigenous plants. The natives also help the local wildlife, live and thrive.

The Eco Group strives to care for the creation that God has given to us.

Property and Maintenance

Properties overall are all in a good state of repair. Work done during the year:

Blarney building – work on the exterior included completion of guttering, walls rendering and ring drainage, gable ends and roof ends repaired, defective slates replaced. All contracted jobs by RBR and Southgates Associates complete. These works were part funded by the Heritage Office, Cork City Council. Interior of the church will require decoration in the near future. Blarney church grounds – laurel hedges on western side have been cut back ready for eco planting in 2023.

Inniscarra – drainage works have been undertaken at the rear of the church – completed. Continued tree planting has taken place through the year.

St Peter's building – the long term wall and roof wet issues in the porch area have been addressed and work completed. These works were part funded by the Heritage Office, Cork City Council. Mysterious floor damp problem continues and is under observation! The Vestry door has been renovated.

Trees in the old graveyard area have been cut back and ground works will continue in 2022. Maintenance of the eco wilding areas and active management of the graveyard areas around the church has continued, with an established cutting management plan in operation.

The Rectory – was thoroughly renovated in 2020/2021 to prepare for the new Rector! The Rectory grounds have been cleared. Side fencing to the building/garden has been installed and will be extended in 2022.

St Peter's Parish Centre – internal painting of the main areas of the building were completed in 2021. Car park and ground clean ups have been undertaken, including power-washing. The carpets were cleaned. The playground equipment is under renovation and nearly complete. The fencing is in process of being painted – will be completed 2022.

Aisling Cottage – minor works have been undertaken in 2022, including installation of airvents, smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

A note on St Peter's Parish Centre, Church Hill in Carrigrohane:

When we came out of lock-down, the 'old' parish centre had suffered from being locked up and left! The red chairs were all mouldy and, along with the rest of the building, needed a good scrub! The re-paint and the carpet cleaning has also put it back into good order and I've been taking bookings for rentals. At the moment, we have Neighbourfood all day on Wednesdays, with Ballet, Cubs, Scouts, Beavers and Venture Scouts, Toddler Sense, Art classes, Puppy Training, Spanish classes, the Coptic Church, the New Apostolic Church and lots of birthday parties and other once-off bookings from groups like Downs Syndrome Cork. It's great to have it so useful to so many people!

Thank you to Daniel, William and Chuck for renovating the playground area, to Barry for fence painting, Charlie & Noah Gould and others (!) for power washing, and everyone else who's helped smarten the place up. Our own parish Wednesday morning fortnightly home group also meets there still! I get there once a week to clean through and set the heat for the week ahead in each area – and occasionally meet potential renters who need to see the place. *Patsy*

St Senan's Prayer Community

The St. Senan's Prayer Community meets once a week for one and a half hours on a Monday evening - in the Prayer Space in the Carraig Centre, on the first

and third Mondays and on Zoom the rest of the time.

We seek to not be a bible study group in the traditional sense, but create a space for contemplative prayer using liturgy, bible meditation and contemplative silence as a way of hearing the invitations of the Spirit that can so easily get drowned out by the busy-ness of everyday life.

Archbishop Stephen Cottrell has described contemplation as 'a quiet attentiveness to God [where] space is made for God. We look at God and listen to God'. He goes on to say that contemplation is a 'desire to dwell in God's presence, to listen to God's voice...asking that God might shape our minds and our will'. His words sum up what we are trying to do together.

Everyone is welcome to attend. At present we are a men's group, which has allowed us attempt to seek to be open and honest with each other, but we would also love to see a women's contemplative group develop.



Tuesday Growth Group

All during the pandemic, Growth Group has been on-line and even now when things are gradually lifting, the Group still meets on-line on Tuesday evenings at 7.30 pm. We changed this spring to

Tuesday nights from Thursdays to allow the Post-Alpha course to continue in person in the Carraig Centre. Being on-line offers our members a safe way to participate and for those far afield (Limerick, Malahide and Wimborne in Dorset) to continue in the fellowship! It has been a rich time of digging into the Parables of Jesus, the Prayer Course (Pete Greig - 24/7 Prayer), and most recently using the Ephesians series that was given and recorded starting during lockdown last This series January 2021 vear. is now posted on www.cupcork.ie/sermon-podcasts and is a wonderful way to allow a group or individuals to use the teaching we enjoy at Sunday AM. 
Sunday AM in the Carraig Centre:



But there are no hygiene products or cosmetics because these are just too big and too heavy. In order to support our action, we ask you to donate the following products as one individual package, one bag for one woman.

What should a package consist of: 2 x pack of night / long sanitary pads with wings; 1 x pack of regular sanitary pads with wings; 1 x pack regular panty liners; 1 x toothpaste; 1 x shower gel (for women, girls or boys); 1 x shampoo; 1 x toothbrush (for an adult / child); 1 x antiperspirant; 1 x pack of cosmetic pads; 1 x face and hand cream; 1 x packet of disposable razors; 1 x hair comb / brush

Where do I bring it? - <u>You can bring packs to Church on Sunday Morning or the Carraig</u> <u>Centre during the week</u> and we'll get them over to ...

Who will the products go to? To bag for every woman who comes to Cork (Cork area) from Ukraine. **Additional information:** We do not collect clothing or used items. Take your time – please make complete sets, even if it takes a couple of days to gather all of the products.



The Carraig Centre

Community Service

Our main focus in the challenging 2021 year was to serve the community by making space available in as many ways as possible. This ranged from renting out space to groups as varied as Enable



Ireland Adult Day Services to several Pilates and exercise groups, to baby and toddler parent support groups, dance and drama groups and the YMCA, covering a wide range of ages and stages of community life. During 2021 over 30 groups used our spaces on a commercial basis. Enable Ireland was particularly important as several of the service users had considerable difficulty being kept at home all the time, and also as an essential service they made it possible for us to stay open during lockdowns.

In addition, during lockdown periods we made our secure play areas available for booking at no cost to the users. Individual families and community groups supporting e.g. special needs groups simply rang up and booked an hour and the space was safely theirs for the allotted time. Many times we witnessed wider family groups coming together, e.g. grandparents able to meet their grandchildren for a safe outdoor play session, sometimes for the first time in a year or more. This was a very popular facility that was often completely booked each day from 10 am to 5 pm. During the summer months we erected shelter awnings over the garden area, and these provided welcome shade and rain protection at varying times right into the autumn period; several birthday parties were made possible due to these shelters as outdoor only gatherings were possible.

Volunteers

During 2020 we assembled a great team of volunteers to provide Reception and general duties around the Carraig Centre. After the general re-opening in the summer and autumn of 2021 we were fortunate to have many of our team back again. It is very clear that this team is an essential part of keeping the Carraig Centre going in multiple ways. Being the friendly presence on the Reception Desk or on the telephone, ensuring that the place is clean and tidy, taking messages and interacting with the many guests who use the various services, we could not adequately keep the Carraig Centre going as we do within its cost constraints, without them! We have had three new members this year and we would be delighted to have more as we do not yet have cover over the entire week.

Of course, there are many others who volunteer in less obvious ways as well, maintaining the premises, gardening, installing signs and fixtures, removing rubbish to the dump, serving on the Board of Directors and working through piles of documentation and procedures necessary to ensure we are working responsibly and with accountability. Some of this work is coordinated through The Carraig Centre Operations Group (TOG).




The Future

At this point only about two thirds of the Carraig Centre is refurbished. The West Wing as it has come to be called, still is in its original state. Several options were explored during 2021 including use as a Library, use as a temporary secondary school, use as a remote working hub, use as a medical imaging facility and finally simply extending the existing East Wing facility into the West Wing and running it as an integrated whole. This latter option is now our main strategy, and we are exploring options for funding to complete the refurbishment. The Board will be bringing a proposal to the Select Vestry in 2022 on how this may be done.

CUP YOUTH PROGRAMME

The **Youthwork at Carrigrohane Union** has taken a very different structure to previous years, in order to adapt to the ever-changing social climate as we all dealt with Covid restrictions. There have certainly been disappointments and things we missed out on, such



as the much annual "Bandon Trip" at Easter, however, looking back it's amazing to see how much we *have* been able to do.

The Summer holidays are usually a time when the programme winds down, making room for other events like holiday club and New Wine as well as many normally going abroad. Summer '21 was an opportunity instead, to get into a routine of weekly "Summer Glow" (4th to 6th class) and "Summer Glow MAX (secondary school)" sessions. We made great use of the outdoor

space at TCC, enjoying lots of games and chill time. The response was very enthusiastic from young people and their families and helped build up momentum after a long time on zoom.

Although the CIY Move Youth festival didn't take place in person- we were able to run our own mini version at TCC where a small group of our teens gathered for music, food and fellowship and explored how Jesus is for All, for Us, Forever!

Glow and Glow Max were able to run



monthly throughout the year, as



we continued to meet outdoors as much as possible (braving the elements!) as well as selecting "pod friendly" activities. We even had to split Glow over 2 evenings from December-February to accommodate the high numbers and remain Covid compliant!

Later in the year, Sunday PM, our Bible study group, began meeting again twice a month and we have been looking at creative ways to explore questions of faith with a small group of young people. A lot has changed this year too with Matt's appointment as Church Army evangelist in TCC in November and Katie also stepping into a new chapter in her journey in March. The impact they have had on the young people in the parish over the years is beyond measure and though it's hard to see them move on, we're so excited for all that God will do in and through them in this next stage. Thank you to Katie, Matt and all the Goulds for the love they have poured and continue to pour into this church family.





In spite of the many challenges throughout the year, we have had the opportunity to get creative and experiment with alternative expressions of worship and gathering together. Though we have been limited in some ways we've also experienced God's limitless love and grace at work in the lives of our young people, their families, our leaders and beyond.

Looking forward, as the Youth Review Group works on putting together a recommendation for the programme in the future, it will be exciting to see new growth in the coming year as we continue to build upon both the highs and the lows of this past season.


