The Lighthouse Messy Church



The theme for October was Harvest Thanksgiving and we adapted a Messy Church session produced by Christian Aid. The session was based around the question: if God created earth with enough resources for everyone to live full and happy lives, why do so many people not have the resources to live full and happy lives? The bible story used in this session was from Luke

12: 15-24: the story of the rich farmer who built bigger barns when he produced a bumper crop.

The activities were: (1) Bigger barns junk modelling: great fun was had here with lots of barns of different sizes produced and used during the story telling. This proved to be the most popular

collage: where a colourful collage was created of all the things for which we wanted to thank God. (3) Global connections: this looked at the idea of how everyone around the world is connected, and the choices we make





are felt right around the world. (4) Story corner: Frank and the pea stalk, an adaptation of the familiar story of Jack and the

beanstalk, produced by Christian Aid, which is about climate change and its effects. Unfortunately, as we were

short a leader, nobody was attracted to this activity. (5) Prayer people paper chain: here paper chains of people

were made and decorated as we prayed for people who did not have enough food, having seen what was in a food pack for those who needed food. We used material





from the World Food programme for this. (6) Planting seeds: here a pea seed was planted to link in with the video of Esther, which we watched during story-time, who was helped by Christian Aid to grow and sell pigeon peas, which are drought resistant and so she was able to feed and educate her children and grandchildren.

After the activities we had our celebration, where we sang action songs, had our story and creative prayer times, where all fully participated. The afternoon ended with a meal for all where the menu was rice with beef stew or vegetable curry and finishing with apple-cake.

The next Lighthouse Messy Church takes place on Sunday 26th November 3.30-5.30pm in the Carraig Centre.

A poem or two

During October, myself and Revd Abigail had the privilege of attending "Clergy Away Days" held this year in Rosscarberry, at the Celtic Ross Hotel. This is an annual event for all clergy in the Diocese. Bishop Paul Colton invites a speaker to help us think on a particular theme. This year was to my mind a very helpful and timely reflective piece on how to lead in a world without maps. The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cotterall helpfully presented various images to help – Compass, River, Orchestra and Garden.



During the sessions we were reminded of our calling to the place of prayer and the centrality to space. We were also asked to take time to write some poetry. During his sessions, the Archbishop also shared some of his own writings.

Mothers' Union RISE UP

In September Robert (Devoy) and I headed up to Dublin (with Bishop Richard Clarke) to the 2nd of the two day-long conferences, 'Changing the Story' – launching the on-line course 'Equipping the Church to Take Action and End Domestic Abuse'. Robert had been part of the original pilot for this course, and really recommends it to us all.

The next three opportunities for any of our parish groups (or a specific group of interested people) to take the course are: Wednesday mornings from 10.30 am to 12 noon from 10th January to 7th February 2024 and Wednesday evenings from 7.30-9 pm from 10th April to 8th May and 25th September to 23rd October 2024.

The conference days also highlighted the on-line Changing the Story Wellbeing Group – which runs over 12 weekly sessions and is based on the vision of Kintsugi Hope – 'to discover treasures in life's scars.' The conference days were organised and facilitated by Mothers' Union here in Ireland, along with Bishops Appeal, Tearfund Ireland and the Church's Ministry for Healing – and we were delighted to welcome people from across the Church of Ireland (a good few Bishops were able to attend), and other denominations and churches – as well as other interested and involved charities and professionals. We had two wonderful key-note speakers: Bekah Legg, the CEO of Restored and Rev Dr Helen Paynter, theologian and author from Bristol. To quote one participant, 'I have seldom heard scripture expounded with such authority and impact – I wish I could bottle their message and have it shared in every church in Ireland!'. It would be fabulous to welcome either, or both of them, to Cork someday!

Mothers' Union has now begun it's RISE UP against domestic abuse campaign.

Parishes are challenged to consider working towards the Bronze, Silver or Gold awards. To achieve the Bronze award your branch or church should: 1. Put a RISE UP poster raising awareness about domestic abuse in an appropriate public place such as in churches, toilets, community centres, village halls etc.

Commit to pray for those affected by domestic abuse, including the victims, survivors, perpetrators, and those who work in the field of domestic abuse.
 Make a connection with your local domestic abuse support organisation to see how you can support them. You could offer moving in and moving on packages.

Diocesan News

New Rural Dean for Cork City



The Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, the Right Reverend Dr Paul Colton, is pleased to announce that he has appointed the Reverend Meghan Farr to be the Rural Dean of Cork City. Meghan is priest-incharge of Saint Anne's Parish, Shandon in Cork and also chaplain to Saint Luke's Home. Her ministry as rural dean will be in addition to these ministries and she succeeds Canon Daniel Nuzum who was rural dean of Cork City for many years.

Each Diocese of the Church of Ireland is divided into archdeaconries which, in turn, are divided into rural deaneries. The entire United Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross is organised also as one archdeaconry, but it, in turn, is divided into four rural deaneries: Cork City, North East Cork, Mid-West Cork and West Cork.

Rural Deans are appointed by the Bishop from among the clergy of the diocese. While rural deans have a particular role supervising the care of church property within their rural deanery area, they may also be assigned other duties by the Bishop.

Archbishop of York Visits the Diocese

From Wednesday, 11th October until Friday 13th October, the Archbishop of York, the Most Rev. Stephen Cottrell visited Cork, principally, to speak at the Cork, Cloyne and Ross Clergy Away Days at the Celtic Ross Hotel in Rosscarbery.



Every year, the Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, the Right Rev. Dr Paul Colton invites all the clergy of the Diocese to spend time together to reflect on ministry and to engage with a guest speaker. Archbishop Cottrell's talks throughout the two-day event centred around the theme of 'How to lead in a world without maps: four images that may help.'

On Friday, before returning to the UK, the Archbishop attended a lunch for lay ministers in the Diocese, which was hosted by the Bishop and Mrs Susan Colton at their home. Matt & Sarah Louise attended this event.
