


#### The Lighthouse Messy Church

This month the theme was God's Big Story and the activities were: Imaginative creatures where we thought about God's amazing creation; Path Shuffle where we followed a



Hebrew and Greek alphabets and copied verses or letters creating our own scroll; weaving where we created a mat from paper and thought about what people rested on in biblical times and



the story of the paralysed man that Jesus told to stand up and carry his mat home (see Matthew 9:1-7);

Praise Phrases where we got to use words on cards to create phrases to praise God; and Match the Story where we thought about what stories

**Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development** has launched a disaster appeal in response to the catastrophic flooding in Libya. The floods, which were triggered by a Mediterranean storm, were focused on the city of Derna where almost 4,000 people are known to have died and over 9,000 are missing after torrents of rain and debris swept away entire districts.

Some 37,000 people in flood-affected areas have been displaced by the storm. The huge number displaced highlights the immediate humanitarian need for survivors now (facing needs of clean water, food, shelter, utensils and clothing), and into the coming months and years (rebuilding, reuniting, finding a safe place to call home).

#### Support on the ground

This disaster has hit a country that already had a very complicated political situation, with power struggles leading to two opposing governments within Libya, and this has compounded the challenge of getting aid and support into the country.

The Bishops' Appeal will be channelling all funds through Christian Aid who are working with Dan Church Aid (DCA), its ACT Alliance partner, who have had an established presence in Libya since 2011, providing a confidence that those on the ground have a clear understanding of the situation and how money raised in our parishes can be used most effectively. We are grateful for the confidence that this gives us that all money raised will be used to benefit those in greatest need.

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#### **Diocesan News**

The Commemoration Weekend for the 1400th Anniversary of the death of St Fin Barre, the Patron Saint of Cork, came to a close on Monday, 25th September, the Saint's Feast Day. Throughout the weekend a series of events were offered at St Fin Barre's Cathedral to allow everyone to visit, pray, and enjoy the beautiful surroundings of the Cathedral and its grounds.

Beginning on Friday morning at 11 am, the three local primary schools were presented with Wildlife Kits from the Cathedral's Operations Manger, Eoin Murphy, and the Deputy Lord Mayor, Cllr Colette Finn. The cathedral also arranged for a drama to be performed for the pupils to learn about the history of Cork.

In the evening Choral Evensong officially opened Culture Night at the Cathedral, which over 800 people attended this year.



On Saturday 23rd September Bishop Paul Colton started the day with a Commemoration Service. Nearly 1,000 people visited the cathedral throughout the day, of which nearly 80 people were Finbarrs and 1 of which was a poodle named Finbarre! Bishop Paul Colton had a small present for each of them. In the afternoon members and champions of the St Finbarr's GAA and St Fin Barre's National Hurling and Football Club visited together with the Lord Mayor, Cllr Kieran McCarthy.

In the evening the Celebrity Organ Recital with the renowned organist and composer Naji Hakim took place

and everyone celebrated the 10th Anniversary of the Organ rebuild. Naji travelled from his home in

the South of France especially to be with us for the weekend. On Sunday, 24th September, a Festival Evensong for the Patronal Festival of Saint Fin Barre took place at the Cathedral. The preacher was the Dean of Ossory, the Very Rev. Stephen Farrell. As part of the Evensong a specially commissioned icon of Saint Fin Barre was consecrated by the Bishop



On Monday, a Quiet Day and Retreat for the clergy of the



Diocese led by the former Archbishop of Armagh (and former Dean of Cork), the Right Reverend Dr Richard Clarke, took place at St Fin Barre's Cathedral. Refreshments for the clergy were provided all day at the Bishop's Palace.

The commemoration weekend culminated in the evening with the Ordination of the Rev. Martin Steele to the priesthood.

### Development Works at The Carraig Centre

It is amazing how the Carraig Centre facility continues to adapt to the demands we are making as we settle into more normal, post-Covid operations. This brief update will show you some of the larger infrastructure changes underway. All such changes are managed by the Carraig Centre Operations Group (Matt Gould, Rob Devoy, Jane Moffat, Bill Lane) and the Board.

#### Main Hall Movable Wall Dividers

If you have visited the Carraig Centre in the last couple of weeks, you will have perhaps

noticed that something has changed in the Main Hall! With a grant from Cork City Council of €30,000 we have installed, and nearly finished a movable wall that subdivides the Main Hall into a front two thirds and a back third. Since we opened over three years ago we have been using mobile accordion folding screens to close off different areas, but while they provided a degree of visual isolation between areas they don't give any sound isolation. That meant that it was harder to hold two simultaneous activities in the Main Hall. For example, our Sparks Toddler group is very popular and obviously and necessarily runs at high volume, while Enable Ireland is normally in the rear half of the Hall but has several very noise sensitive



half of the Hall but has several very noise sensitive clients. Up to now we have solved this problem by giving Enable use of the Playroom and the Sparks group using mostly the front half of the Hall, a solution which while workable didn't satisfy either party due to less than optimum use of the various spaces! Now with the excellent acoustic isolation the new walls provide, both groups are delighted with their spaces and can co-exist in perfect harmony! Some on-going work is now needed to finish painting and some electrical work, e.g. moving emergency lights, electrical sockets and the speakers on the rear pillars, but the main function is complete. We hope to complete all the remaining works during an Enable Ireland staff training break in mid-November and fund the supporting building works costs of nearly €6000 from our own funds.

### Fire Door Hold Opens



Fire safety has always been an important operational issue for us all in the Carraig Centre. With many users now and especially with several wheelchair users, ensuring that fire doors (those interior doors with blue circular labels stating "Fire Door Keep Closed") are not impeded or left in a fixed open position overnight is an important safety precaution. Shortly after opening we installed 7 automatic "Fire Door Hold Opens" on high traffic routes, including the Main Hall Double doors and Disabled Toilet access, Enable Ireland contributing 50% of the cost. An awkward name but an essential feature. Matt Gould applied for and won a grant for €25,000 to install another 12 such units on other doors which take a lot of traffic and are at risk of being left open. These units will hold the door open until a fire alarm sounds at which time they let the doors swing closed. Installing the unit now is significantly harder than if we had done it during the original building programme but given our cost constraints at the time it

was left out. This work will proceed slowly due to the restricted access of our busy daily schedule, but we hope to complete during the school midterm break and November Enable Ireland break. I for one will sleep easier once these units are installed!

### Solar Photovoltaic Panels

Around September time last year Jessie Kindler put me in touch with a company who works within the SEAI Community Energy scheme, SE Systems,

within the SEAI Community Energy scheme, SE Systems, and who organises community orientated energy saving projects under this scheme. After completing an energy audit for us, complementing us on the high quality of the Carraig Centre space from an energy point of view, they have developed a proposal which has just recently received verbal approval by SEAI for funding under the Community Energy Scheme. This is a particularly advantageous programme as the majority of our entire costs of around €57,500 to install roof mounted Solar Photovoltaic panels, storage batteries and grid feed in




inverter will be covered by a mix of direct grant from SEAI and community funds from commercial enterprises who make contributions into the scheme. We will fund the <u>residual</u> costs of around €5000 ourselves. If and when we receive the formal approval, I am told the installation should commence in October or November. Given the large additional cost of our electricity this year the mitigation offered by the panels will be most welcome this winter!

### West Wing Development

While the West Wing is a lovely unfinished space, useful for the Christmas Fair and other such activities, our plan is to refurbish the space and bring it up to a standard and usefulness similar to the existing East Wing. As soon as funding becomes available to us, we expect the detailed design and build to take round 15-18 months and would provide roughly 50% more space. As we are frequently turning away prospective community activity groups and agencies such as the HSE looking for training and community interaction space, we believe the additional space available to the growing town of Ballincollig would be quickly filled and would generate additional revenue for our outreach activities and staff.

It is unfortunate that we use the word "love" in many different contexts in the English language. It is used as the one word to fit all occasions in a sense. The love for our parents, best friend, romantic partner, grandparents, siblings and from people unto things like our job, car, mobile phone and so on. Other words indicating love seem to have dropped down the list in the use of everyday use of the English language. Words like adore, affection, fondness, passion, devotion, sweetheart, amity and even charity.

The Ancient Greeks had eight words that corresponded to distinct types of love that would be particularly useful if we used them or their equivalent in the present times.

**Eros (romantic, passionate love**) The first kind of love is Eros, named after the Greek God of fertility. Eros is passion, lust, and pleasure.

The ancient Greeks considered Eros to be dangerous and frightening as it involves a "loss of control" through the primal impulse to procreate. Eros is an intense form of love that arouses romantic and sexual feelings.

**Philia (affectionate love**) The second type of love is Philia, or friendship. Plato felt that physical attraction was not a necessary part of love, hence the use of the word platonic to mean, "without physical attraction."

**Agape (selfless, universal love**) The third is Agape, selfless universal love, such as the love for strangers, nature, or God. This love is unconditional, bigger than ourselves, a boundless compassion and an infinite empathy that you extended to everyone, whether they are family members or distant strangers.

**Storge (familiar love)** Storge is a natural form of affection experienced between family members. This protective, kinship-based love is common between parents and their children, and children for their parents. Storge can also describe a sense of patriotism toward a country or allegiance to the same team.

**Mania (obsessive love)** When love turns to obsession, it becomes mania. Stalking behaviors, co-dependency, extreme jealousy, and violence are all symptoms of Mania.

**Ludus (playful love**) The Ancient Greeks thought of Ludus as a playful form of love. It describes the situation of having a crush and acting on it, or the affection between young lovers.

**Pragma (enduring love**) Pragma is a love built on commitment, understanding and long-term best interests.

It is a love that has aged, matured, and about making compromises to help the relationship work overtime, also showing patience and tolerance.

**Philautia (self-love)** The Greeks understood that to care for others, we must first learn to care for ourselves. As Aristotle said, "All friendly feelings for others are an extension of a man's feelings for himself."


