From Robert's Desk!

The world on our doorstep

Dear Parishioners

I write this letter as we look forward to summer holidays. Long days, sun splitting the trees, picnics and all the rest that goes along with summer. These things are important!



I also write this realising that not all is well with the world. I know that many parishioners within Carrigrohane Union are genuinely concerned about the state of the wider world — the war in Gaza, the on-going situation in Ukraine, the climate Crisis, the issues of immigration to name but a few issues.

Having spent 2 days and a night at General Synod (the meeting of the Church of Ireland in Armagh) in the past month I can also see that these things are on the minds of the Church at central level too.

As a Church, at local level we are not silent on these things – In recent months I have spoken on the topic of Israel Gaza – and taken a middle road (not an easy place to be) – that of calling for peace. I do realise that members of the congregations of this union of parishes do have diverse and deeply held opinions on this topic – I will continue to contend that we do need to pray for peace (and work towards that goal) and a political solution to this conflict.

As a nation we do have a particular issue with immigration at the moment and certainly as election candidates come to our doors and share stuff on social media we do need to be aware of political manipulation of communities. Our parish family has long been a place of welcome for people from all over the world – we've recently put up a map on the Carraig Centre main hall wall – showing places from around the world we've come from and made this place home.

Over this next period of time we will see new people enter our community – people who have arrived from all over world – some to find employment, some to flee war & persecution - Human beings made in the image of God who find themselves among us.

Recently the Churches in Ireland have produced a handbook entitled "From Every Nation? – A Handbook for a congregation's journey from welcome to belonging" In the introduction Bishop of Derry, Andrew Foster writes:

"In a society which impetuously demands that we choose single identities and competitive sides, this anti-racism handbook is timely ... In a culture that pushes us to accept an 'us vs them' narrative. Jesus gives us the eyes of faith to see that we are all made in the image of God, where diversity is a gift to be enjoyed This is the upside down kingdom where the foreigner can claim kingdom birthright as much as those who are native born."

On Sunday 20th June Revd Abigail and myself have been working to organise services on what is "Sancturary Sunday" for the second year in the Union of Parishes. This is at the end of Refugee week – More details can be found elsewhere in this magazine.

I also draw your attention to a poem written by Ben Okri - an African poet which cries from the heart for peace in the middle east -The world is on our doorstep – we can decry it our see it as an opportunity to show love and concern for the needs of the world.

Our mission and ministry within the parish is very much focused on the 5 marks of mission — and our neighbour is very much the one who we encounter. I have no doubt that our neighbour will be native irish and migrant and asylum seeker in the years ahead. As a church I do want us to continue to be a church who welcomes all and where all can find a place belong.

The Bishop at my institution service reminded me of the solemn promise I made 15 years ago at my ordination

"To encourage all God's people to be good stewards of their gifts. Care alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. By your words and in your life proclaim the Gospel."

This I do and will continue to do in this place. Regardless of the calls for polarisation in communities – I will call for middle ways –I know its really difficult but there is a need to find solutions which build up and ensure people have their God given identity ratified.

What is a Canon?

In medieval times every cathedral was run by its Dean together with a committee of clergy, each chosen by the Bishop. The committee was called the **chapter**, and its members were called **canons**. Each canon would have his own seat in the cathedral, known as a **stall**, and often each stall would be named after a saint, or after a place in the diocese.

What is an Honorary Canon Missioner?

To be honest I'm not really sure but I'm looking forward to finding out. I do see my role as somewhat encouraging the work going on in all sorts of places across the diocese around 5 Marks of Mission as we reach out into the communities in which we live and work.

We live in challenging times and there is so much need for community engagement with local and global issues - I'm excited as we work out in Cork, Cloyne and Ross what it means to be missional day by day.

Can I come along?

Absolutely – all will be welcome in St. Fin Barres that particular Sunday. It will be a choral evensong – a time of prayer and choral music – yes it's different style to what we are used to in Carrigrohane Union but I do want to extend this invitation to all.

There is an exceptional choir in St. Fin Barre's and it will be an opportunity to be together with members of parishes across the diocese for this important service. Also if you have never been in St. Fin Barre's it is an incredible building – the windows of which portray the whole scope of scriptures – Genesis to Revelation! – a sight to behold.



Worth a thousand of the other?


Surely the heart of the world has died.

Their homes destroyed, their lives broken.


There ought to be no religion that lets

Carraig Centre Connect Update Summer 2024

Summer is always a different time for everyone, the normal rhythms of the school year go out the window! So it is in the Carraig Centre too, almost all our regular providers' classes and sessions wind down between now and the end of June and the summer fun starts up!

This year we have nine different summer camps on offer including two Lego camps run on three occasions, four art and creativity camps on five occasions, a Fashion and Sewing camp, a Chess and activities camp, a Drama and Improvisation camp, some Ukrainian activity camps and the YMCA camp. We will also be hosting two Family Fun days in July and August so lots of things to choose from!

This summer weather is also now helping to drive down our energy costs and improve our green profile! We have fitted and commissioned 24kW of solar photovoltaic (PV) panels on our flat roofs with 10kWh of battery storage (see photographs) and this combination is having an enormous impact during these bright summer days as we have been generating 50% more than we use since the panels were installed 2 weeks ago. The excess is being fed into the electricity grid and we will in due course be paid for it. Of course this will change with the seasons but it's great to start on a summer high! We worked with a coordinating company called SE Systems and the panels were provided and installed by EnergyWise under an SEAI Community Energy Initiative grant.

Currently we are planning a two week shutdown from July 22 to August 8, with the family fun day of July 28 in the middle. We hope to do some maintenance during this time as well as giving a welcome break to staff and volunteers.

Our West Wing plans are gradually shaping up and the Board recently approved moving on to the next step of detailed design, leading to preparation of tender documentation. This is a 3-4 month process so should enable us to begin actual refurbishment during the autumn, everything going smoothly (which it always does!).
